



LOW LIFE CYCLE COST

Significantly lower life cycle costs than Active Component counter-parts

RETAIN AF INVESTMENT

Maximizes prior service accessions and captures costly initial training investments

EXPERIENCE

Increased experience to the Total Force via Continuity of service from Active Component Airmen and transferrable skills and training from employment in the civilian sector

CONNECTION TO THE COMMUNITY

Reserve Airmen are often more involved and connected to the local community as a benefit of living and working off-base, moving less frequently, and being at one duty-location longer
